What excites you so much that it keeps you awake the night before?


Waiting for chimney swifts to be brought to Le Nichoir in July. I literally dream about it!

Since I had recently traveled in Africa to visit rehab centers there I was immediately interested and upset that I had not known of her, and her work, earlier. This past week, Charlotte came down to South Florida and I was able to show her around to a few of the more interesting rescue operations in South Florida.

Whenever a rehabilitator comes to visit us, we always try to get them to spend a few hours in the Florida Keys learning about the rescue and rehabilitation of marine mammals like dolphins and whales. Charlotte had a chance to participate in a Dolphin Plus facility training on marine mammal physical exams and transportation; then she turned it around and spoke with the staff about her work in elephant rehabilitation.
